<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Flat finish – no sheen - Faster drying - Does not reflect light - Hides imperfections and surface defects in timber - Can be difficult to keep clean - Suitable for rooms that receive little traffic such as studies - Use on timber ceilings and timber feature walls 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Also known as a velvet finish - Most recommended finish - Easy to clean with a light wipe - Use in rooms such as bedrooms, hallways and living areas. - Suitable for coating window frames, doors, trims and wooden ceilings 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Significant shine without be overly overt - Easier to clean than matt and satin <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - will withstand frequent cleaning and water - Reflective nature of coating will highlight imperfections if timber is not thoroughly prepared prior to coating - Suitable for bathroom and kitchen doors, windows and trims 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Highest reflective quality - Will highlight the smallest imperfection if timber not meticulously prepared - Can be quite shiny, especially if direct light hits the surface - The easiest surface to keep clean and maintain - The end grain of timber shown best in this coating - Use on windows, doors, trims and furniture for a durable finish

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
